



Information sheet: national visa

Visa for skilled workers holding a university degree/ EU Blue Card (Section 18g Residence Act)

Basic information

- Documents not in the English language must be submitted with a certified German translation. A translation of the personal data page of the passport is, however, not required.
- Certificates, diplomas, etc. must be presented in the original. Your original documents will be returned to you once your application has been processed.
- The Federal Employment Agency and the competent foreigners` authority must where applicable, approve the visa. The visa can only be issued when these approvals have been received.
- **Processing time is as a rule ca. one week** but can take longer in individual cases.
- Flight reservations are not required to apply for a visa – please only book when you have received your visa.
- The mission abroad reserves the right to request further documents.
- Missing documentation delays the procedure and can result in your application being rejected.
- **Please do not contact the mission abroad to check the status of your application during the normal processing period.** Such inquiries are extremely time-consuming for the visa section and can thus not be answered.
- **Please do not staple the documents**

General information

As a *skilled worker with a university degree recognised in Germany*, you will be issued with an EU Blue Card if the employment you want to take up matches your professional qualifications and you can present a contract of employment certifying a gross annual salary of at least € 48 300 in 2025 (for STEM occupations - scientists, mathematicians, engineers, doctors and IT specialists - at least € 43 759.80).

Use the following checklist to make sure your application documents are complete. All documents listed here are to be submitted in the requested form and order.

<p>Completed form signed by your employer: Declaration of employment (original with one copy)</p> <p>There is a minimum salary requirement for the EU Blue Card which is set once a year by the Federal Ministry of the Interior. In 2024, the minimum gross annual salary requirements are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • € 43 759.80 for scientists, mathematicians, engineers, doctors and IT specialists (so-called STEM occupations) and • € 48 300 for all other occupations. 	
Proof of qualification: University qualification (all pages, original and one copy)

<p>Proof of adequate health insurance cover</p> <p>If as an employee you are subject to mandatory statutory health insurance, you must bear in mind that this insurance can only begin when you take up residence in Germany and enter into employment. If you enter Germany beforehand, private health insurance must be taken out for the period prior to</p>	



	employment beginning and prior to being eligible for statutory health insurance. In its terms and conditions, travel health insurance can exclude protection if a long-term or permanent stay is planned. So-called incoming travel insurance can also contain such exclusions.
